

PALM SUNDAY OF THE PASSION OF THE LORD

Biblical commentators tell us that the passion narratives were the first parts of the Jesus story to be proclaimed. Each evangelist approaches the narrative with his unique perspective and one would expect an opening scene in the garden of Gethsemane or in Pilate's courtroom where Jesus receives his sentence, is then tortured and taken off to Calvary for his execution. But in Luke's account that's not what we hear first.

Instead there is a long narrative about Jesus and his disciples at the Last Supper and judging from the goings-on around that table we can imagine that Jesus' passion has already begun - a passion of discouragement, frustration and failure. After being with him for three years the disciples still have questions and still don't understand what he has been teaching them about service and sacrifice for the sake of the kingdom of God.

Jesus is the "Suffering Servant" who speaks to a people enslaved. Their exile is that of weakness and failure. Jesus reaches out to them in solidarity. But they would rather stay imprisoned in their own notions of God and holiness - and of what's right and wrong. They are trapped in their own self-righteousness.

But despite the hostility he meets, Jesus is not a defenseless victim and remains faithful to his mission. His passion concretely speaks the words of Isaiah: "I gave my back to those who beat me, my cheeks to those who plucked my beard; my face I did not shield from buffets and spitting."

The word "passion" has roots in words meaning "suffering" and "being acted upon." There are many people in our world who suffer or have been victimized at the hands of others. Daily we are witnesses to brutal and unprovoked acts of war and terrorism. We see the effects of poverty, world-wide hunger and human suffering on the television screen each evening which heightens our sense of fear and helplessness.

But we also suffer from the pressures of political polarization, economic instability and social prejudice which drain our energy and suffocate our faith.

But "passion" in English also suggests having strong feelings. In this sense Jesus was an initiator, one who felt strongly about what he was to do and went about doing it. He was a passionate lover of God and of humanity, and this passion energized and forged his determination to continue on the path God planned for him - to preach God's love for the outsider. No opposition could prevent this passionate savior from completing his task for us, even when it meant his death.

Jesus comes to us when our hope is shattered and we want to walk away. He comes to us in the poor and the sick and the frightened and the lonely. He comes to us when we grow weak and feeble because of old age or illness, and he lifts us up with the assurance that he will stay with us through the valley of death until we, too, will rise with him to the fullness of life.

Today's narrative ends at the tomb. But as we enter Holy Week we come not to focus on the Crucified Christ in sadness and sorrow, but to worship the Risen and Living Lord with hope and joy. It is he who challenges us, who transforms us, and who enables us to be courageous witnesses of his presence to others.

DAILY MASSES DURING THE PASCHAL TRIDUUM

Here at Sacred Heart there will be NO 12:00PM Mass this coming Thursday and Friday, Holy Thursday and Good Friday. There will be NO 9:00AM or 5:00PM Mass this coming Saturday, Holy Saturday. The Paschal (Easter) Triduum is a single liturgical action that occurs over a period of three days (Holy Thursday, Good Friday, Holy Saturday). The Triduum is not part of Lent, but in its entirety celebrates the Easter event. The entire focus of the Triduum is on the Triumph of the Cross and the Resurrection. For this reason, Mother Church invites all Her children to join together and to participate in the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday, the Lord's Passion & Death on Good Friday, and the vigil, the time of waiting, for the Lord's Resurrection on Holy Saturday. No other Masses are offered on these days because all the faithful's attention and energy needs to be focused so that these events, which are the cornerstone of our faith, can be made present again in the time we live.

GOOD FRIDAY COLLECTION

The continued existence of programs that support Christians in the Holy Land depends on the faithful financial support received from our brothers and sisters in Christ from the Good Friday collection. This year, more than ever, we ask that you pledge your assistance to the work in the land that Jesus made holy. The Holy Land Franciscans are counting on your financial help to assist them in providing presence, care and service. The Franciscans have been in the Holy Land since 1209, walking in Jesus' footsteps, caring for the poor, educating young people, providing scholarships, protecting the Holy shrines, conducting pastoral ministries and keeping Christianity alive.

THE EVENTS OF HOLY WEEK ARE AS REAL TODAY AS THEY WERE 2,000 YEARS AGO

Beginning with the Easter Triduum as it's source of light, the new age of the Resurrection fills the whole liturgical year with its brilliance.1 The Eastern Churches call Holy Week "the Great Week." The mystery of the Resurrection, in which Christ crushed death, permeates with its powerful energy our old time, until all is subjected to him.² In Christ, time takes on a sacramental quality of memorial, actuation and prophecy. Time thus becomes a pressing sign of salvation, "the day of the Lord", his ever-present "hour of salvation.' Anamnesis, memorial, is the Jewish principle behind this Christian celebration of time. What is remembered is not merely celebrated, but relived or made present again, re-presented or replayed. God's past events are present in our events, refashioning our lives in the continuous process of conversion to Christ. Those events are made present here and now as offers of grace. This week is Holy not only because of what we remember but because of what it can accomplish within each one of us as we give our voluntary "Yes" to its invitation.3

ARCHDIOCESE OF NEWARK 2025 LENTEN REGULATIONS

The <u>days of both Fast and Abstinence</u> during Lent are <u>Ash Wednesday and Good Friday</u>. If posible, the fast on Good Friday is continued until the Easter Vigil (on Holy Saturday night) as the "paschal fast" to honor the suffering and death of the Lord Jesus, and to prepare ourselves to share more fully and to celebrate more readily His Resurrection.

The other Fridays of Lent are days of Abstinence. On a day of Fast, only one (1) full meal is permitted and two (2) smaller meals, which added together, would not exceed the main meal in quantity.

Those between the ages of 18 and 59 are obliged to fast. **On a day of Abstinence**, no meat may be eaten. Those who have reached the age of 14 are obliged by the law of abstinence.

- 2. The obligation to observe the laws of Fast and Abstinence "substantially", or as a whole, is a serious obligation.
- **3.** The Fridays of the year, outside of Lent, are designated as days of penance, but each individual may substitute for the traditional abstinence from meat some other practice of voluntary self-denial as penance.
- The time for fulfilling the Paschal Precept (Easter Duty*) extends from the First Sunday of Lent, <u>March 9, 2025</u> to the Solemnity of the Holy Trinity, <u>June 15, 2025</u>.

*Canon 920, §1. All the faithful, after they have been initiated into the Most Holy Eucharist, are bound by the obligation of receiving Communion at least once a
